Hi I am Alex Mowry, and I am a High School junior, who went to New Jersey because my grandparents, Joan and Richard Mowry, thought it would be a good idea. I had gone to Canonicus when I was younger, so I thought this might be a kind of adult camp experience, especially because we stayed in a Methodist church camp, while we worked.

I worked to rebuild a house destroyed by Hurricane Sandy in October 2012 and worked with a team of great people but one that sticks out the most was pastor Paul and the amazing stories he had to share.

When asked what impact the trip had on my faith, I felt that the trip renewed and restored my faith. I felt God used me in the reconstruction work on the house. I am not sure it changed my thinking in any way but it was a great experience for my life.

I was given money and used it for a gift of a pocket knife like the one we showed during Children's Chat. It was for Pastor Paul, because he was such a great and inspirational leader.

Hi, I am Andrew Guilmain, and I am 16 years old and a Junior in High school. When I went to New Jersey I mainly worked to rebuild a home destroyed by hurricane Sandy, 1 ½ years ago. I did dry walling and had never done it before.

I tore down a ceiling, carried furniture, and did other construction jobs. I met some amazing people from North Dakota, who came to "repair it forward." They had floods in their city, and many homes there were damaged, but those people came to help others on the East Coast.

The motivation of other workers was so uplifting. Our supervisors, Pastor Paul, Barry, and the other men were uplifting examples to me of Godly men.

The trip impacted my faith because it really showed me how far people are willing to go for other people to do God's work. I shared my faith with others. It was great to see other people who were not exposed to church, to experience God's presence.

I felt like God used me to show other people there is hope and there is faith. People who have experienced hard times don't need to give up, because someone, like us, was there to give them hope.

Methodist church of New Jersey is pairing with Catholics and Baptists and others to repair 300 home in New Jersey – we worked with them on 3 different homes in Cape May, the southern tip of the state.

All 4 boys prayed to accept Christ or rededicate their life during the drive down to New Jersey.

Alex and Josh were walking by the kitchen on a Saturday night when we arrived, exhausted, with a truckload of groceries to be hauled in. God put them in the right place at the right time.

God protected our car from a near fatal collision, when we were making a turn, and another car came speeding around the bend, and missed us by inches. We know people were praying for our safety that day!

We were scheduled to cook a barbeque dinner on Sunday but found there was no grill. Someone from the community, who came to church Sunday morning, out of the blue asked if we could use a large grill for the week.

Our 6 hour drive turned into 9 ½ hours, and Kelly and crew had to shop and cook for 45 people as soon as we arrived. Yet Kelly and Roger served excellent meals –tacos, kabobs, chowder, salads, lasagna, and even a turkey thanksgiving dinner – which all fell together, despite changes, challenges and frustrations. We ate well and had healthy options.

God put a great pastor, Pastor Paul from Pennsylvania on our team with a heart for "Feeding the lambs." He spent time talking and working with our teens, and touched them in different ways.

One member of our team was hearing impaired. God put her with someone who could communicate easily with her. He also spoke to her through a Methodist pastor who spoke about how hearing impaired people pray with eyes open, as they hear better that way. That resounded with her and affirmed what she had learned but was feeling a bit guilty about – she did hear and pray better with eyes open.

When I was especially discouraged at the end of one day, that tho work on the house was not up to the standards I hoped, I prayed that God would send someone to see and comfort me. And minutes later, the Coordinator, Denise came by to hug, talk and encourage me. She reminded me that my purpose was not necessarily just to build that physical, storm damaged house, but perhaps His purpose was a bigger part of building God's house or kingdom. God used her, and He used each of us in so many ways that one week. The prayers of each one back home, and the support from fellow workers made this trip truly God-centered.
